Be Prepared As you visit, do your part to keep Utah Forever Mighty. Learn more The Fiery Furnace isn't named for its average temperature. Actually, it belies its name and remains fairly cool even in midsummer due to the many shady canyons. Instead, the area was named for the reddish glow it often takes on at sunset, which resembles a furnace. It's an unusual and moderately difficult hike thanks to narrow passages and some rough terrain, and it's a hike you won't soon forget. The best way to see the Fiery Furnace area of Arches National Park is to take a ranger-led tour. You can explore the area by yourself with a hiking permit obtained at the park's visitor center (there is a nominal charge either way), but on a guided tour you'll learn ten times what you would on your own. Also, you will have much less impact on this fragile desert environment. How to Visit Arches Overview: A ranger-led (or permit required) hike to a rare desert environment named for the reddish glow it often takes on at sunset, which resembles a furnace. Start: Fiery Furnace Parking Area Distance: 2 miles; loop Difficulty: Moderate Maps: USGS Arches National Park; Trails Illustrated Arches National Park Finding the trailhead: Drive north into the park on the main road for 14.5 miles and turn right (east) at well-signed Fiery Furnace Road (just after the Salt Valley Overlook). Park in the Fiery Furnace Parking Area, which is a short drive from the main road. Trailhead GPS: 38.742929, -109.565722 The Hike During prime season the guided trips can fill up fast, sometimes weeks or even months in advance, so call in advance (435-719-2299) to reserve a spot. Because of the rough terrain, the NPS only allows hikers over 5 years old. For current information on Fiery Furnace tours, visit the park's website. Two defined trails leave the trailhead, but they soon melt away into a fascinating puzzle of crevasses, fins, and boulders. This maze of canyons may be one of the most difficult areas to hike in the park, but it's also one of the most remarkable. The scenery, especially the steep-sided canyons and weirdly shaped rocks, along with several arches and bridges, is unforgettable. The Fiery Furnace also provides critical habitat for many rare plant species, such as the Canyonlands biscuitroot, so please be careful not to step on black-crusted cryptobiotic soil (desert topsoil) or delicate plant communities. Try to walk exclusively on rock or in sandy washes. Just past the turn off for the iconic Delicate Arch is a bent and twisted labyrinth of sandstone fins called the Fiery Furnace. There are no trails, signs, or cairns inside the Furnace and GPS units don't work well in the tall, narrow canyons. Due to the confusing nature of the landscape and the fragile ecosystems they contain, there are only two ways a person can legally enter this part of Arches - by picking up a Hiking Permit at the Visitor Center (after watching a required orientation video and proving you have navigation equipment and know how to use it) or by joining one of the ranger-led tours held twice a day, generally from March to October (although those dates may change). Additional off-season ranger-led tours may be available depending on the weather and can be purchased in person at the Visitor Center. First time visitors are strongly encouraged to join a ranger-led hike - and even more strongly encouraged to purchase their tickets well in advance of their visit. There are a limited number of spots on each hike and they tend to sell out quickly. If you manage to snag a ticket, meet at the turn-out for the Fiery Furnace 10 minutes before your start time. A ranger will meet you with the group, give you an idea of what to expect on the hike and start the tour. You'll get a good primer on the region's geology and history - especially helpful if you plan to do more traveling around the Colorado Plateau - and then you'll make your way inside the Furnace itself. While there aren't any established or marked trails inside the Furnace, the rangers have mapped out a route for their guided hikes so in some places you can clearly see some of the stones have been worn down to an effective use-trail. Right away, you'll start the trek by scrambling up some boulders, walking through tall, narrow canyons, and ducking under low miniature arches. Throughout it all, the ranger will point out some of the more interesting rock formations along the way, including huge arches and bridges and eroded spots that will eventually become those huge arches and bridges. And small ones, too - like the aptly named Crawl-through Arch which, yes, you will crawl through. Since you're touring the area with a ranger, you don't really have to worry about paying attention to where you're headed inside the Furnace. Instead, you can just enjoy the region's otherworldly landscape up close and personal - since you'll be squeezing through it, sliding down it, and hopping across big cracks in it. After one final squeeze through a narrow crack in the boulders, you'll wrap up your tour in a huge, secluded amphitheater capped off with Surprise Arch overhead. On my tour, the ranger led a final question and answer session inside the amphitheater and shared his very personal story about coming to Arches as a ranger. He then asked if anyone else in the group wanted to share their favorite National Park and most of us volunteered - it was pretty moving, actually, to be in such a unique place with people from all over the country who loved the Parks so much. Afterward, the ranger will lead you out of the Fiery Furnace and back to the trailhead. Things to Know: Hikers must pick up their permits at least an hour prior to their start time at the Visitor Center Meet at the trailhead 10 minutes before your start time Children under 5 are not allowed. Children 12 and under must be accompanied by an adult. The best thing about going on a ranger-led hike is that you don't have to worry about where you are going and potentially getting lost, you can focus on having fun and enjoying your hike! 2. Counter-clockwise Loop There is one route in Fiery Furnace that is marked by small markers, this route starts from the trailhead in a counter-clockwise loop. National Park Service discourages hikers from following cairns or other hiker-made trail navigation, and to follow the NPS markers- although they are intentionally designed to blend in with the rock. Since they blend in, make sure you are constantly aware of your surroundings. Fiery Furnace is difficult to navigate, so going in a group with people that have route finding skills is extremely important. Make sure you talk to the rangers who issue you the day-use permit about best practices and important information. When to Hike and Seasonal Considerations Permits are issued for use between sunrise and sunset on a specific day. They frequently sell out during the busy season, so it is best to check in-person at the Visitor Center for availability. Necessary Permits Day Hike Permits Day hike permits are required for Fiery Furnace, unless you go on a Ranger-led hike.
